R RELIABLE Information you find on the internet may not be true, or someone online may be lying about who they are.

T TELL Tell your parent, carer or a trusted adult if someone or something makes you feel uncomfortable or worried, or if you or someone you know is being bullied online. You can report online abuse to the police at www.thinkuknow.co.uk

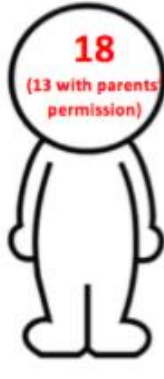

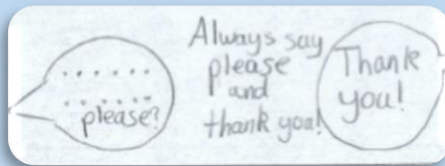

- Keep you informed about school policies, activities and events through regular newsletters.
- Inform you of any concerns regarding your child's learning or well-being.
- Encourage your child to work hard and do their best.

Attendance

A huge thank you to all parents and children who have supported good attendance at St Josephs this year. It is fantastic to see children in school every day making the most out of amazing opportunities that help develop their learning and social skills.

Children arriving late - Children find arriving to school late upsetting and they miss out on important opportunities.

Please see punctuality pyramid which gives a step by step guide to lateness.

We have adapted our attendance timings slightly to link with our five foundations approach.

Please work with us to provide your child with the best chance of learning by ensuring they are in school every day and on time.

Impact of Lateness

Being 15 minutes later each day is the same as missing 2 weeks of school



5 minutes late
= 3 days learning lost

10 minutes late
= 6.5 days learning lost

15 minutes late
= 10 days learning lost

20 minutes late
= 13 days learning lost

30 minutes late
= 19 days learning lost

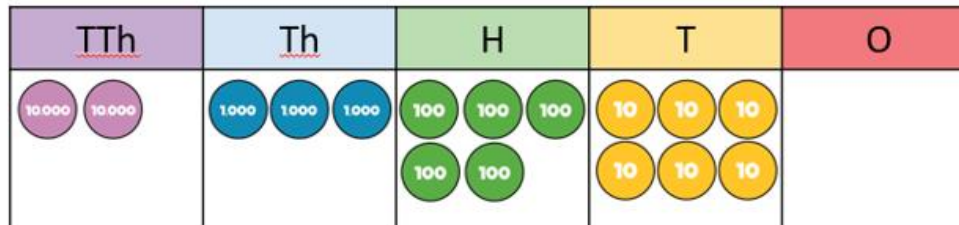


Mathematics

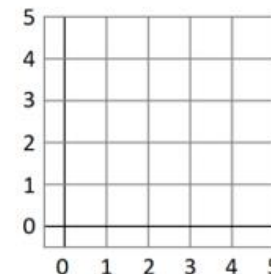
In year 5 we like to begin the lesson by briefly re-capping previous learning or setting some questions based on core understanding. We call this a flashback 4.

We ask that children keep the book they are reading in their bags so that we can read with the children in school as well.
- Although we encourage children to read their reading book from school at home, they can also read other books at home too!

- Homework will be set on a Thursday and will be due in the following Wednesday. (1 piece of maths, 1 piece of English and spellings).
- Please speak to your child's class teacher if there is an issue in completing the homework to the set dates.

- Times tables practise - TTRS!
 - Encourage your child to learn and practise their spellings to improve their writing.
 - Encourage your child to complete their homework at home.
 - Instil a love of reading!
